Quality framework of the programme

- ECHE- European Charter for Higher Education- entry ticket for HEIs provides the general quality framework for European and international cooperation activities a higher education institution may carry out within Erasmus+
- Inter-Institutional Agreementscan be signed between two or more higher education institutions (HEIs), so providing for the possibility of mobilities between groupings of institutions.


Overall picture in Europe

Staff mobility for teaching (2-60 days)


Staff mobility for **training** (2-60 days)
